LISA HENDEY By Nick Strait

It's only fitting that for the month of May, the month in which we honor mothers, the speaker at the May breakfast was Lisa Hendey, the founder of the website CatholicMom.com. A Fresno native, Lisa is also the author of [The Handbook for Catholic Moms: Nurturing Your Heart, Mind, Body and Soul](#). She shared her experiences raising children in the Catholic faith as well as the rise of social media in the church.

Growing up, Lisa was the eldest of five children (three girls and two boys). She attended the University of Notre Dame where she met her husband, Greg. They met during her junior year in South Bend and ended up getting married a year later. Ironically enough, her sisters also attended Notre Dame and met their husbands as well, a real Fightin' Irish family! Today, Lisa and her husband, the parents of two boys, can be seen at the 9:30 am Mass at St. Anthony's where Greg plays his guitar.

It was at St. Anthony's in 1999 that Lisa began the mission of creating her website. At first, Lisa was merely looking for ways to volunteer at the church, beginning with helping at the St. Anthony's Auction. At the conclusion of the auction, Lisa wanted to do more, and took on the task of the parish's website. Having no previous web design experience, Lisa took it upon herself to learn everything she could about the medium, spending a great deal of time in the library and reading several "For Dummies" books.

After successfully completing a website for St. Anthony's, Lisa launched CatholicMom.com in 2000 after hearing Pope John Paul II's call to evangelism. The creation of CatholicMom.com provided a website for women around the country to connect and share their experience of raising children within the Catholic faith. At first, Lisa was glued to the counter of the website, rejoicing after reaching 100 hits. Today, the site has grown to nearly 2.5 million visitors from over 160 counties, with contributions from not only women, but also men, deacons, and priests from all over the globe. As Lisa puts it, the site is a place to celebrate faith, family and fun. Her site has even become popular in non-religious circles. For example, she's had a number of vegans visit the

DON'T BE LATE! **Personal Perspective** **By Lanny Larson**

As a nearly triple-digit-aged man, I remember being a single-digit-aged boy sitting (OK, fidgeting.) with his mother and sister at Holy Redeemer Church in Montrose, Calif. At 7 a.m. Mass we sat in the pew behind perpetually scowling old ladies who sat behind the nuns who taught Saturday Catechism classes I attended. On the Altar, his back turned toward us, was Msgr. Patrick Healy, who spoke in a language unfathomable to me. Something like: "I can beat you playing dominos."

With equal clarity, I recall what happened when the church doors loudly squeaked (I bet they deliberately never oiled hinges.), followed by the sound of someone trying to tiptoe up the aisle to a back pew: anything not to attract attention. I didn't actually see them, because they never ventured as far forward as we were. And if I turned around I risked "hard looks" from behind or a sharp pull on the ear by Mom, whose peripheral vision was astounding. I didn't have to see, though, because I felt the collective silent shaming from the Altar on back. How dare anyone not be in place and kneeling a few minutes before Mass. Early enough to pray a full Rosary – or at least a decade. We earlycomers judged them to be late and deserving of scorn (which we could administer) and penance (which we could not).

Coming in late was judged to be a disruption, and I think it still is. We're on time for work, for classes, for meetings, kids' plays, restaurant reservations, concerts and mere acquaintances' weddings and funerals. But the one appointment each week that's supposed to matter to us as Catholics? Not so much. Oh there are excuses, although "The cat ate my car keys" isn't good enough. My fave is, "A priest told me once that you really aren't late unless you get there after the Consecration." You know that's bogus because Father wants us there for both the homily and the collection.

BOOK REVIEW - By John Kasaian

The Essential Belloc

Edited by Rev. John C. McCloskey, Scott J.
Bloch & Brian Robertson

Hilaire Belloc, like his contemporary GK Chesterton, was a prolific writer and staunch defender of the Church. While Chesterton wrote like a knight might use his sword - carefully making precise thrusts in order to get his point across, Belloc was more the artilleryman who quickly aimed and let loose a cannonade. It is part of his charm as a writer, and reading Belloc one often comes across essays within essays which brilliantly describe the plight of the Catholic within a very UN-Catholic society. Or perhaps a description of a village or road or river or plain of such beauty that Belloc's words take the shape not of letters and sentences, but of old inns smelling of beer and tobacco, and ancient forests echoing foot falls on the dried leaves and the sounds of animals.

Such short respites are themselves treasures worth reading, and looking over this collection it's easy to see that not a few contemporary wise men think the same. The introduction written by Fr. James V. Schall, SJ, a notable Catholic author in his own right, and comments on the back cover by the esteemed Charles J. Chaput, O.F.M. Cap., Archbishop of Denver bear witness to the sound philosophy Belloc espoused when discussing things like appreciating the Mass (the Latin one), the continuity of religious feasts, and the richness of 2,000 years of culture embraced by simple Catholic men and women. Or wry observations on the fallacies of his day (which is very much like the fallacies of our own day):

“St. Thomas had said it centuries before---that if men abandon the idea of God as the supreme good they would tend to replace him by the idea...that material wealth is the supreme good.”

Belloc reminds us that we originated in a very different time, but that time is never so far away that it does not make itself unknown nor unwelcome:

“We craved these things, the camp, the refuge, the sentinels in the dark, the hearth—before we made them; they are a part of our human manner, and when this civilization has perished they will reappear.”

If you are looking for some summer reading broken into easily savored bite-sized pieces, here's a book for you!

website for her selection of meatless recipes, which she often posts during the Lenten season.

Lisa also discussed the rise of technology within the Catholic Church and the need for the church to not only be involved in social media, but to also embrace social media. As the webmaster for St. Anthony's Parish, she shared her experience in educating the clergy within the Fresno Diocese on the benefits of technology, even at one time participating in a video conference meeting with priests throughout the Diocese on social media. From that event, Lisa showed one of her favorite pictures, a picture of Bishop John Steinbock, who himself embraced technology, holding his iPhone to share with the group (he particularly liked his golf apps).

One of Lisa's most exciting moments came this past spring when she was selected to travel to Rome and attend the Vatican Meeting for Bloggers. Hosted by Pontifical Councils for Social Communications and Culture, Lisa was one of only 150 Catholic bloggers (out of nearly 850 applications) to attend. And from that count, only eight were selected from the United States. In addition to the great honor of being selected, Lisa also felt truly fortunate to be able to attend the Beatification ceremonies for Pope John Paul II. Lisa shared with the club her experiences at the ceremonies, even showing pictures from her various vantage points over the course of the celebration.

She concluded with a message of embracing technology, that social media is a great tool, if used properly. As parents, if their kids participate in social media outlets, such as Facebook or Twitter, it's important to learn about social media. As a mother of teenage boys herself, Lisa explained that she monitors her kids on these forums, even owning the passwords to their accounts.
