### February Speaker - David John Casper

CP&BC Fresno's February 2014 speaker is David John Casper — born February 2, 1952 in Bemidji, Minnesota — a retired American football player who now travels the U.S. speaking on faith, sports and business. He was a prominent NFL offensive lineman and tight end nicknamed "The Ghost." Today, Dave assists business owners with financial planning and consultation work.

Dave spent his first three years of high school at St. Edward Central Catholic High school in Elgin, Illinois. His final year of high school was at Chilton High School in Chilton, Wisconsin, and he played collegiate football at the University of Notre Dame, where he earned Honorable Mention All-America as a tackle in 1972. In 1973, he was named an All-American tight end. He earned his bachelor's degree in economics in 1974; he was also the captain of the Omicron Delta Epsilon Honor Society for Economics. He was drafted in the second round of the 1974 NFL draft by the Oakland Raiders.

Casper caught the first touchdown of Super Bowl XI, a 32-14 Raiders victory over the Minnesota Vikings. As a Raider, Casper was selected to four straight Pro Bowls (1976-1979).

Casper finished his pro career with 378 receptions, 5,216 yards, and 52 touchdowns. In 2002, he was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. He was the 13th Raider to be inducted.


# Book Review By John Kasaian

What Were the Crusades? 4th Edition By Jonathan Riley-Smith Ignatius Press, San Francisco 2009 117 pages, paperbound

I enjoy Church History but this little book took me by surprise as it does not take sides but is rather a dispassionate look at what is considered to be a Crusade and how they were conducted. I was treated to bits of the preaching of St Bernard of Clairvaux which aroused the passions of the populace, but this book presented through the dispassionate eyes of a scholar--- not a bad thing. In fact it is what makes this book so interesting, in particular the fine points of the Just War principles defined by Augustine and Aquinas. What makes this relevant today is the comparison of Just War with the very strange excuses given for much of the military adventurism going on today.

Another point worthy of attention is who exactly were the crusaders? There were military orders, but most crusaders were comprised of the young and old (mostly old) male and female (yes, female) not-so-commoners of the day, bound by an oath, the exact wording often changing, but the crusaders freely agreed for the oath to be binding until the objectives of the oath were achieved.


Yet another point covered was the cost of the Crusades and how revenues were raised---and you thought taxes are oppressive today! With little to offer as recompense for the taxes, indulgences were offered, and it is easy to see how the burdens of over taxation and rather sketchy ideas for indulgences played into the hands of the Protestants seeking to divide the Church.



This is a really interesting book and while it sounds sleep inducing, it is not. It brings to mind questions as relevant in today's mid-eastern drama as they were in the times of Popes Urban, Calixtus II, Eugenius III, Innocents III & IV, and Gregory VIII.

Monsignor John Griesbach was born in Tulare, California as one of six children: two brothers, Tom and Bill; and, three sisters, Marmie, Donna, and Beth.

He grew up in a strong Catholic family where there were priests frequently in their home. So from an early age, young John was interested in religious life and had a great admiration for the clergy. One of his favorite memories was of Monsignor Jim Maloney taking him and his brother, Tom, for a plane ride over the family home. Down below, a parent said, "I think Monsignor Maloney just dive bombed our house with the boys!"

John's family had a lumber business, and John grew up learning all aspects of the business from cutting trees in the forest all the way to selling the lumber in the lumberyard.

John was baptized October 8, 1950 at St. Aloysius in Tulare, had his First Communion in 1957, and was confirmed in 1962. He attended St. Aloysius School (Tulare), Ryan Seminary (Fresno), St. John's Camarillo Theology Studies (Menlo Park), the American College (Belgium), and was ordained in 1976. His served in parishes in Tulare, Fresno, and Kern counties, was a Vice Rector at American College in Belgium, and is presently the Director of St. Anthony Retreat Center, Three Rivers, CA.

Monsignor's hobbies are fishing and oil painting. He is noted for his landscapes, and he has painted many scenes of the Central Valley, the Sierras, and the state's coastline. He says that "Painting landscapes captures the deep spirituality he feels reflected in the natural world." Sports are also of great interest to him. He enjoyed competing in softball until an injury made it impossible to continue.
