Speaker Recap – Kenneth Crammer--Becoming a Better Christian

Self-knowledge is the key to becoming a better Christian. The Catholic Catechism states this is where one must start to serve God and affects how one "hears" God. Paraphrasing Coach Vince Lombardi, one must chase perfection, knowing it cannot be reached, but in the striving excellence can be achieved. Teresa of Avila spoke of never departing from the path of self-knowledge. God's love must be fully accepted in order to love self.

Cramer cites author Matthew Kelly in Dynamic Catholic that only 7% of parishioners are responsible for 80% of church accomplishments. Those "engaged" Catholics are persons of prayer, study, generosity, and evangelization. He asks us to imagine the results if that number were multiplied.

The call to holiness requires putting others first. In so doing, unity can result. Unity is mentioned 66 times in the Bible.

After a life of childhood abuse, drug addiction, and suicide attempts, through God's grace, Kenn found his way out of sin and despondency, earning bachelor's and master's degrees in psychology and spending a year in seminary. For 10 years he ran a Denver psychotherapy practice. In 2015 he and wife Laura answered a call to serve at the Belknap Indian Reservation in Montana. Kenn is studying for the diaconate with expected ordination in 2018. He is a frequent public speaker and television guest.

Kenn advises that a good way to start each day is asking God to "Help me see myself as You see me."

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

By John Kasaian Saint Odd by Dean Koontz 449 pages, paperbound Bantam Books, New York 2015

It was with a bit of sadness that I started reading "Saint Odd" a few days ago. Sad because this is the last of the eight-book series by Dean Koontz featuring the iconic



Odd Thomas, a love sick teenage fry cook from the Mojave desert who sees dead people and bodachs, the shadow figures who gather en masse before bloody tragedies and for whoknows-what purpose.


For a protagonist, Odd Thomas is a refreshing change and for plots, the Odd Thomas series is a feast for the imagination. As grisly as these stories are, dealing with cults, satanism, ritual, human sacrifice, supernatural dimensions, as well as more garden variety murders, they are also held together with threads of incredible humor. The ghosts of Elvis Presley, Alfred Hitchcock, and Frank Sinatra take turns being Odd Thomas' "sidekicks" in the various installments. Better still, Koontz, a Catholic convert, gives us portrait of a supernatural world which, while not exactly theologically sound (this is fiction,) gives us imagery and ideas Catholics will find both familiar and comforting.

For the past few years I've been reading through the Odd Thomas series and, while it is enjoyable to skip around from book to book, the best plan is reading the series in chronological order, starting with "Odd Thomas" (Editor's note; reviewed by John Kasaian in September 2016 newsletter), "Forever Odd," "Brother Odd," "Odd Hours," "Odd Interlude," "Odd Apocalypse," "Deeply Odd," and finishing with "Saint Odd." Odd makes for excellent paperback reading on cool fall days or at Pismo Beach (trust me!)

Remembering a Veteran

November is the last month of the Year of Mercy and also the month in which we celebrate Veteran's Day. This year there are also many events remembering the Vietnam War. In commemoration of these events it is fitting to recognize Servant of God, Maryknoll Missionary, Vincent R. Capodanno (1929-1967). He was a United States Navy chaplain who served in the Marine Corps which used Navy men since



they had no chaplains of their own. He posthumously received the Medal of Honor. That citation reads in part "In response to reports that the 2d Platoon of M Company was in danger of being overrun by a massed enemy assaulting force, Lt. Capodanno left the relative safety of the company command post and ran through an open area raked with fire, directly to the beleaguered platoon. Disregarding the intense enemy small-arms, automatic-weapons, and mortar fire, he moved about the battlefield administering last rites to the dying and giving medical aid to the wounded. When an exploding mortar round inflicted multiple painful wounds to his arms and legs, and severed a portion of his right hand, he steadfastly refused all medical aid. Instead, he directed the corpsmen to help their wounded comrades and, with calm vigor, continued to move about the battlefield as he provided encouragement by voice and example to the valiant Marines. Upon encountering a wounded corpsman in the direct line of fire of an enemy machine gunner positioned approximately 15 yards away, Lt. Capodanno rushed a daring attempt to aid and assist the mortally wounded corpsman. At that instant, only inches from his goal, he was struck down by a burst of machine gun fire..."
