Matthew Archbold will be flying into Fresno from Philadelphia to kick off CP&BC Fresno's 2018/2019 Breakfast Meetings. Matt is the father of five children, an author, and a columnist for several prominent Catholic publications.

His comedic and inspiring tales of raising five children in "The Catholic Digest" have moved many to laughter and tears, while his thoughtful take on current events, pro-life, and religious liberty issues at "The National Catholic Register" has garnered him a large and faithful readership.

His own blog "Creative Minority Report," whose tagline is "We laugh because we believe," has become one of the most popular Catholic blogs.

Matt's book, "Faith Under Fire – Dramatic Stories of Christian Courage," has received wide acclaim for its portrayals of Christians facing intolerance, oppression, and even violence with expressions of love and faith.

Deacon Greg Kandra, award-winning journalist and multimedia editor for the Catholic Near East Welfare Association, a papal agency established in 1926 dedicated to giving pastoral and humanitarian support to Northeast Africa, the Middle East, Eastern Europe, and India, called Archbold's work "Superb." He called the book "a bright beacon of hope" which will leave readers "uplifted, inspired, consoled, and enriched."

Marjorie Dannenfelser, president of the Susan B. Anthony List, said that Archbold "highlights the urgent need for a national conversation about – and defense of – religious liberty, the bedrock of our nation."

Danielle Bean, author, editor of "Catholic Digest" magazine, called Archbold "a gifted reporter and storyteller," who makes "stories come to life," and will "light a fire in your faith!"

Speaker Recap Deacon Lawrence Klimecki

The entire world is different because you are in it, and there is no such thing as an “ordinary” person, stated June speaker Deacon Lawrence Klimecki from Sacramento. “Be the hero of your own story,” he urged.

Defining a hero as someone who sacrifices self for others, he uses modern media such as “Star Wars” and “Lord of the Rings” as examples for self-discernment, learning who God wants us to be. We often resist, seeing it as a lot of trouble, feeling unworthy, or fearful to leave safe environments. Once we have done so, however, the revelation causes us to view life through fresh eyes.

On the journey to self-discernment, we risk and gather allies and mentors who advise and guide us through trials, challenges, obstacles and temptations. The adversary likes to hide in what we once found satisfaction: pleasure, pride, and power. At this point God might ask, “Can you handle it?” just as Luke Skywalker was questioned in “Star Wars.” We are then challenged to stay or return to help others. That’s where the real work begins as we use our gifts to bring change to the world. “I am” transforms to “we are” as it did for Saint Damian of Molokai who became one of the lepers he served. As Jesus stated in John 15:13, “No greater love is there than this: to lay down one’s life for his friends.”

Deacon Lawrence also is an artist whose intent is to reveal God in our surroundings and touch upon the reason for existence.

The author of the Narnia books gives the reader in "The Great Divorce" an allegorical tale in response to Blake's "The Marriage of Heaven and Hell" – not that the reader needs to have read

Blake in order to understand what "The Great Divorce" is about.

Besides CS Lewis is fun to read, Blake not so much.

Here is a dream, Dante-esque but uniquely Lewis, Oxford Don and Cambridge Chair of Medieval Literature, and raconteur extraordinaire.

Set up your hammock, pack up your Dunhill with Three Nuns, and pour a tall one, for this promises to be good!

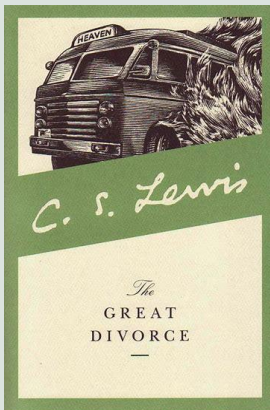
Hell is an immense gray town sparsely populated by the damned. Sparsely populated because no one gets along, so they perpetually quarrel and keep moving out of the neighborhood. Just like Los Angeles. Our character boards a day tripping bus bound for Heaven, taking ghosts who have finished their time in Purgatory along with simply prideful ghosts who want to argue with the Saints.

Heaven is a painfully uncomfortable place for transparent ghosts and the day trippers move around in great discomfort, each greeted eventually by a Saint who urges them to repent and climb with them up the mountain and get solid.

Our character is met by Philosopher George MacDonald, Lewis' answer to Virgil from Dante's Inferno, and sees first-hand the Great Divorce, the myriad of pride which keeps sinner's in hell and apart from God in Heaven.

I found "The Great Divorce" a grand little book, forcing the reader to meditate on the uncomfortable subjects of good and evil, grace and judgement.
