Our May 13, 2022 speaker is Fr. Alex Chavez, pastor of Visalia's Good Shepherd Parish and called by Bishop Joseph V. Brennan to lead the parish in the completion of construction of the parish's new, 3,100 seat St. Charles Borromeo Church. The massive church is being built in a mission style architecture with the familiar crossshaped floor plan, but utilizing modern design and building techniques necessary to build at a significantly larger scale.



Fortunately, before being ordained a priest, Fr. Alex studied Civil Engineering at Fresno State and worked nearly eight years as a Civil Engineer for the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans). During his career at Caltrans, he worked in three of their units: Construction, Project Management, and Design. Providentially, the last project he worked on before becoming a priest was the preliminary design work of the 6-mile stretch of Highway 101 in the City of Prunedale, where Highways 156 and 101 merge. This highway, as many of you know, roughly follows the same route as the El Camino Real, the original road traveled by Fr. Junipero Serra over 250 years ago between the original nine, then ultimately all twenty-one California missions.

We look forward to seeing a great turn-out at our breakfast on May 13th when we will hear so much more from this inspiring priest in our own diocese and all about the exciting progress toward opening the largest parish Catholic church in the United States. Bring a friend to hear about this new mission church where, as the architect states, "the power of over three thousand Catholics coming together can give testimony to Christ's love for us and emotionally move us as we share our Catholic faith."

April Speaker Recap – John Martignoni

Many Catholics are afraid to engage in religious discussions because they do not know the answers, reported April breakfast

speaker John Martignoni. One can be ignorant and still evangelize, he stated. A chapter in his book, "Blue Collar Apologetics," is devoted to "ignorance strategy," which is no excuse in today's high-tech world, he says – look it up!

John grew up in Huntsville, Alabama where only 3-4% are Catholic. In his professional world of banking and finance, when co-workers brought up faith questions after discovering he was Catholic, he would ask, "Why me?"

John became compelled to respond to radio programs maligning the Church, and teaching that Catholics were going to hell, and were not considered Christian. He founded the Bible Christian Society which now reaches tens of thousands in all 50 states and 70 countries. He has given hundreds of talks at parishes and conferences in the U.S. and Canada. John advises humility when speaking of religious matters but taking advantages of opportunities to open discussions and plant seeds. Simple things such as placing a Bible on one's desk or making the sign of the cross before eating lunch can provide openings for discussion among one's circle of influence.

John was disturbed by a recent survey which revealed that two-thirds of Catholics do not believe in the Real Presence in the Eucharist. Never skip over John 6:51, he exhorts, (Jesus the living bread). Ask, "was Jesus' flesh on the cross real, or just symbolic?" Jesus, truth, values, knowledge, and salvation are all interrelated. No compromising inside the Church or within the family, he cautions. Know official Catholic teaching and don't avoid "hot button" issues.

In faith matters, be offensive without offending, John says, "Remember, the Bible is 'our book,' -- we gave it to the world!"
