
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Book Review

The Day Is Now Spent | By Robert Cardinal Sarah
with Nicolas Diat | Ignatius Press, San Francisco
2019 | 349 pages paperback



Contemporary Catholic writers, it seems, have an infatuation with writing books about how bad the society is and ending with an optimistic conclusion.

There are many excellent books following this formula written by talented and entertaining writers; however, something important seems to get lost in the brevity. I think this is where Cardinal Sarah's books stand apart from the usual offerings.

"The Day Is Now Spent" is a Q&A format with the excellent French journalist Nicolas Diat. His questions are brief and to the point, and Cardinal Sarah's responses are thorough and concise with citations when useful. The English translation is remarkably well done, both easy to read and captivating.

The subjects of these "discussions" are intriguing—fascinating really.

Part 1 deals with Spiritual and Religious Collapse, especially concerning the Priesthood.

Part 2 deals with Man Belittled, basically the pervasive culture of nihilism.

Part 3 deals with The Fall of Truth, Moral Decadence, and Bad Political Habits.

Part 4 deals with Rediscovering Hope: The Practice of the Christian Values.

I really enjoyed this book; it is one of those rare books which presents ideas that stay on your mind many days after you have read them.

Who Was Saint Valentine?

The real St. Valentine was very unlike our image of a cherubic cupid shooting arrows at lovers and associated with hearts, candy, and flowers. There were likely three “Valenti,” at least two of whom died on February 14, executed in the third century when persecution of Christians was still common. We know this from an order of Belgium monks who spent three centuries collecting evidence on lives of saints. They were called Bollandists after Jesuit scholar Jean Bolland. The monks produced 68 volumes of Acta Sanctorum (Lives of the Saints) between 1643 and 1940.

All that is known of the first Valentine is that he died in Africa along with 24 soldiers. The second involves a Medieval legend of a girl cured of blindness, whose whole family converted to Christianity, but that Valentine was beheaded by the emperor for his action. The third was Bishop of Terni in Umbria, Italy, who was also beheaded after healing a child. Because of their similarities, the second and third stories could be the same. Several churches and monasteries claim to have bits of Valentinian skull.


The romanticism perhaps stems from a Medieval legend that St. Valentine performed Christian marriages and passed notes between jailed lovers. In Canterbury Tales, Chaucer reports on a feast associated with the mating of birds, and European nobility began sending love notes during bird mating season. Shakespeare’s Ophelia spoke of herself as Hamlet’s Valentine. St. Augustine reminded us in the fifth century that someone does not have to be standing before us to love them.

If you forget to remember a loved one on February 14, you can wait until July when St. Valentine is celebrated by the Eastern Orthodox.

Book Review

In October 2020 Jon Leonetti, the March 2019 speaker at our Catholic Professional & Business Club, released his book “Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Holiness.”



Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Holiness

The book title is an adaptation of the phrase in our Declaration of Independence. As Jon says in his prologue: “the whole point of this little book: God, your creator, did give you life, and He does give you liberty, and the only reason for living is to pursue holiness,” and “there’s only one way to find happiness, and that’s to pursue holiness.” The purpose of the book, therefore, is to teach us how to be holy.

In Chapter One, Jon tells us that we are “God’s Gift to the World,” and that we Catholics are aware that everything else created by God is less important than us human beings. In Chapter Two, “God’s Plan for Your Life,” he says that God has already told us what his plan is – in the Bible! Yes, in the whole Bible God is telling us His plan in many different ways. In fact, He also wants us to be a saint because He wants us all to go to heaven. The problem is that we sometimes forget why we are here.

“So, Why the Catholic Church” is the title of the third chapter, and the answer is that we are aware that the winning game plan is “Holiness leads to heaven.” In Chapter Five, Jon gives us three saints as models of deeper prayer and how they built their relationships with God: Saint Teresa of Avila, a Model of Advancement; Brother Lawrence of the Resurrection, the Model of Simplicity; and, the Silence of Saint Joseph.

Chapter Seven tells us how to become a Backyard Missionary in these times of the declining number of self-identified Catholics, real ones, not just in name only. And Jon tells us that our home base is just that, our home with things of God on display but without any need to turn our home into the Sistine Chapel – just enough to show that our faith is important to us.

Jon finishes the book with Chapter Eight “Holiness Personified,” Mary, the mother of Jesus. Jon ends with the concluding thought: God gave us Life and Liberty, but that “we’re not going after the shiny baubles of this life ... We’re pursuing holiness.” In other words, we need to strive for holiness in our daily life because it leads to sanctity, and therefore heaven.
