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June 11 — Bug Hall

Our final speaker before our summer break will be Zooming in to our June 11th breakfast meeting from his home in Toledo, Ohio.

At the age of eight, Bug Hall went from living in a one-room duplex with his mother, stepfather, and three siblings to starring as Alfalfa in Steven Spielberg's "The Little Rascals." From a rundown Fort Worth suburb to the neon lights of Hollywood. From a school play ground to A-list parties and fame, where who you are is what you are, truth is relative, and the only rule is "don't let the paparazzi find out." A chance meeting with an exorcist would begin Bug's long road to the Truth ... Incarnate.

Beginning with the idea that hitting his mark was Bug's main job for nearly 30 years and how that relates to the classical definition of sin as "missing the mark," Bug makes the point that God uses the events of our lives to prepare our hearts for Himself. For his talk with CP&BC, he will touch briefly on his experience growing up in Hollywood, his initial conversion to the Catholic faith, and how he spent years trying to reconcile his new faith with his career. Unable to do that in the current climate within the entertainment industry, Bug finally decided to give up his success and leave Hollywood to pursue a life of simplicity, because the only real success in this life is a life well lived with Christ at its absolute center.

Bug spent his childhood making movies and T.V. shows for every major studio and network. During that time, he experienced continued abuse by various predators in Hollywood. In his pre-teens he fell into the use of alcohol and drugs as a means of escape, but after the death of a close friend in his early twenties, Bug decided to get sober. After his sobriety he continued to work as an actor, while also focusing on writing. His scripts were picked up for development by major studios, but the development process on one particular project led to a chance encounter with a Catholic priest, who also happened to be an exorcist. A contentious conversation about human nature, objective truth, and the existence of God quickly became a moment of extraordinary grace. Bug converted to Catholicism that very night.

After nearly 30 years in the entertainment industry starring in more than 50 T.V. shows and films, Bug quit his company and asked to be released from his Netflix show. He saw clearly that running the Hollywood rat race was just another wide gate and crooked path. He left Hollywood to follow Christ's example of simplicity and live an authentically Catholic life, so as to run the only race that matters — and enter the narrow gate of salvation.

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Book Review

Roman Workbenches, a short treatise on benches from Pompeii, Herculaneum, and the Holy Roman Empire

This is the year honoring St. Joseph. Though little is written about him in the New Testament, he is one of the most popular of patron saints – as well he should be.

One of the things that we know about St Joseph is that he was a carpenter, but what did carpenters do in Judea during Roman times? Woodworking, of course, but what did they make, and how did they make it – especially a village carpenter like St. Joseph?

Unlike today's specialized trades like cabinet makers, framers, roofers, finish carpenters, etc., a village carpenter in the first century would have been equivalent to a blacksmith only working with wood instead of iron – whatever needed making, he'd make. There was no Crazy Bernie or Overstock.com back then.

Like the blacksmith, carpentry was a highly skilled and profitable occupation. That changes the popular narrative of the Holy Family as being impoverished, doesn't it?

Consider the tools of the carpenter's trade. Unlike what you can pick up on sale during Father's Day at Lowes, carpenters (like blacksmiths) made many of their own tools; however, even those tools couldn't be made without very basic steel tools to make them. Considering steel for a saw – two thousand years before the Bessemer converter, steel was a scarce and costly commodity; a carpenter's tool kit, therefore represented a sizable investment.

For any woodworker, contemporary or ancient, one of the most important tools is a workbench – a sturdy immovable surface to hold stock firm so it can be sawn, planed, joined, etc. Knowing how a workbench was used should give insight to the carpenters who used them, and we hope, a tiny glimpse into the vocation of St. Joseph.

This brings us to Christopher Schwarz's entertaining book, "Roman Workbenches." After observing pictures of woodworking benches from 79 AD, when Mt Vesuvius entombed the cities of Pompeii and Herculaneum, Schwarz was intrigued by these workbenches that appeared more like benches one would find in a garden than the massive tables seen in woodshops today.

Drawing up plans, Schwarz constructed three benches from pictures found in Pompeii, Herculaneum, and a later bench from 1505 which features a built-in end vise.

Surprisingly, these low benches were less fatiguing as they allowed for working on wood while seated, and sawing while kneeling, both features which make my lumbar challenged back take interest. "Roman Workbenches" is both a journey of discovery and time travel, as Schwarz takes the fortunate reader along with him across two thousand years, giving us a glimpse of the carpentry trade as practiced by St Joseph, the spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Speaker Recap – Ms. Cheryl Sarkisian

“See whatever you do as a ministry and each person as a child of God. Be a good listener, be just and charitable.” Those are characteristics May Zoom speaker Cheryl Sarkisian strives to exercise daily in her position as Diocese of Fresno Chancellor for the past year and as Safe Environmental Coordinator since 2012.

In the latter position, Cheryl receives calls related to protection of children and adults, hears stories, takes them to the Bishop, reports to law enforcement, and refers complaints for internal investigation. A diocesan review board makes recommendations to the Bishop for final decision.

Cheryl's role as Chancellor involves being the official diocesan archivist (record keeper), secretary to the Bishop's cabinet, receiving and disseminating daily updates from the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops.

A cradle Catholic, Cheryl experienced a spiritual rebirth in her thirties. Turning points involved the loss of her home in a fire and seeing Saint Pope John Paul II. Cheryl has been deeply influenced by the writings of Scott Hahn.

The Diocese of Fresno consists of about 1.4 million Catholics with records going back to about 1870. It was first part of the Diocese of Los Angeles, then Monterey; Fresno, becoming the Diocese of Fresno in 1967. The Covid pandemic affected diocesan and parish finances, often resulting in staff reductions, but a positive was that it forced focus on essentials. Many pastors became very creative in keeping their parishes alive and well.

Asked what the laity can do, besides supporting the church financially, Cheryl reminded us that prayer is a major weapon, and since volunteerism is down, to step up in one's parish.

Cheryl spoke briefly of her two powerful and spiritual short walk Caminos. She hopes to do a full one when she retires in about three years.

She reported that Bishop Brennan is a pleasure to work with, being a joyful person who brightens every day.
