
Ten Reminders for Christophers

The Genius in The Design

I found this to be a fascinating book on the lives and times of two rival architects in 17th century

Rome whose brilliance transformed Rome into the extraordinarily beautiful city it is today. Gianlorenzo Bernini and Francesco Borromini earned the patronage of powerful families and popes, and were commissioned to build treasures such as St Peter's Basilica, San Giovanni in Laterano, the Piazza Navona as well as numerous other chapels, fountains, and churches all over Rome.

Bernini's and Borromini's lives were intertwined by intense competition for commissions and patrons, and while they began as colleagues their relationship became heated and even hostile. Just the engineering problems they had to solve would make an interesting book, but here we have the complete drama encompassing art, the Roman Curia, stone cutters, murder, mayhem, and more.

It's an entertaining history and one of the best parts (for me) is that people seeing me reading this book on 17th century Roman Architecture presumed that I'm smarter than I actually am. Here's your chance to impress the clientele at Starbucks – pick up your own copy at Cotter's.

June Speaker Recap Tim Staples

By age 10 Tim Staples knew he wanted to be a preacher, yet in his early teens he ran from God and became totally out of control at 16. He returned to faith in his late teens with a fervor for converting others, influenced by Assembly of God TV evangelists Jim

Baker and Jimmy Swaggart. His favorite targets were Catholics, and he was determined to prove the Catholic Church wrong. He knew he lacked discipline, which he found in the Marine Corps. His fundamental anti-Catholic viewpoints were challenged by a fellow Marine who was well versed in the faith. In his explorations, he would ask, "Is this the devil?" and "Show me this is false." Finally, in 1987 his Catholic understandings went "from head to heart," attributed to the intercession of Mary. After college and seminary training, he became a Catholic apologist and now is Director of Apologetics and Evangelism at Catholic Answers.

In October 2021, Tim suffered a major stroke with months of brutal rehab which he considers a blessing for teaching humility and purification. He spoke of how in the midst of trials, confession can be a powerful healer. Trust in God must not be in abstract terms, but in absolute dependence.

Comments Tim shared: Take time for quiet meditation, for often where one wants to go is not what God wants, and sometimes it hurts. He believes that Marian doctrines are important for spiritual growth. To those who may be disillusioned with the Church, Tim advises, "Don't leave Peter because of Judases." Focus must always be on the presence of Jesus in one's life. He stresses not to take faith and the Church for granted – share!

A prolific writer, Tim recommends his books "Nuts and Bolts" (explaining and defending Catholicism), "Behold Your Mother," and "Surprised by Truth" (on eleven converts), as well as his video "Why Be Catholic?" These may be ordered at a discount with free shipping by calling (619) 599-0205.
